## Sharing Stories





Over the year, the committee provided guidance and support as needed, particularly prior to the 31st Annual Emerald Awards, which was the first inperson award ceremony since June 2019, resulting in the need for adjustments to the communications strategy from previous years.

Overall, the AEF's communications and outreach strategy proved to be fruitful, as can be seen through the quantitative data provided throughout this year's annual report.

As per the annual review schedule, the Governance Committee compiled and updated a prioritized list of AEF terms of reference and policies over the past year.

This past year saw the following policies created, reviewed or updated: Complaints Policy, Risk Management Matrix, Risk Management Policy, Executive Director Annual Review, Executive Committee Terms of Reference, Consolidated Fundraising Policy, AEF Delegation of Authority Matrix, and Membership Policy.



The committee is currently reviewing and updating governance and operational policies: Resource Development Committee Terms of Reference, Communications & Outreach Terms of Reference, Youth Grants Policy, Privacy Policy, Human Resources Manual, and Finance Committee Terms of Reference.

The committee will continue to update or develop new policies over the 2023 year with the goal of positioning AEF to be aligned with Imagine Canada recommendations by 2024.

#### John Parkins, Resource Development Committee Chair



This was a year of changing leadership for the AEF, and the Resource Development Committee also went through a change in leadership. New members worked hard to understand the history of resource development within the Foundation and build on this legacy with a renewed sense of purpose and urgency.

One area of development over the past year was to establish a broader set of connections to potential donors in more diverse sectors of the economy, including agriculture, forestry and

technology. Specifics and organizations were identified, with an emphasis on umbrella organizations that provide oversight and leadership for an entire sector, such as a commodity group, or an agriculture commission. Our committee members reached out to several new and potential donors, and these connections led to new relationships that we will continue to foster in the months and years ahead. One particularly important connection was established with the Alberta Forest Products Association. This relationship has also led to a new board membership from the AFPA and a deeper relationship with the forestry sector as we work together to identify and celebrate environmental achievements in the province.

The second area of focus involved leadership from Marisa Orfei and Sabrina Huot, who worked diligently to update our sponsorship packages and sponsorship levels. These revisions to our sponsorship materials highlight and clarify the value proposition for potential donors, and also give potential donors a wider range of options in terms of financial support for the Foundation.

In addition to maintaining relationships with stable and ongoing sponsors, the committee continues to seek a wider range of sponsors to reflect the diversity of our province in terms of geography and economic activity. By doing this work, we hope to support the mandate of AEF to identify and celebrate environmental achievements across the province.









## 31st Annual Emerald Awards

#### About the Emerald Awards

Since 1992, the Emerald Awards have showcased over 350 recipients and 850 finalists who are raising the bar in addressing environmental and climate change issues. These environmental awards celebrate excellence across all sectors, making them unique not only in Alberta but also in Canada.

Nominations for the 31st Annual Emerald Awards were open between November 2021 and February 2022.

### **Emerald Awards Judging Session**

Each year, the Emerald Awards shortlist and recipients are chosen by a thirdparty panel of volunteer judges. These judges bring expertise from various sectors across Alberta, helping to ensure a fair and equitable process.

45 nominations were received for the 31st Annual Emerald Awards and were distributed to our judges to be evaluated and scored. Once each nomination was reviewed, our judges met for two full days to determine the nominations to appear as part of our shortlist, and which of those would be named the recipients at the awards ceremony on June 1, 2020 at the Calgary Central Library.

#### **Emerald Awards Shortlist Announcement**

On March 25, 2022, we shared the 31st Annual Emerald Awards Shortlist with the public through a live virtual announcement, allowing indivudals and nominees from across Alberta to attend. 44 people from across the Province joined us for the virtual presentation.

Our announcement was recorded and later shared on our webiste, emeraldfoundation.ca, and our YouTube channel. As of November 8, 2022, the video has been viewed 129 times and reached over 1,700 people.

## 31st Annual Emerald Awards

#### The Emerald Awards Event

The 31st Annual Emerald Awards was our first in-person awards ceremony since the 28th Annual Emerald Awards in 2019 and was held in the Patricia A. Whelan Performance Hall at the Calgary Central Library. Emerald Awards Shortlisters, Alberta Emerald Foundation board & staff, and members of the public were delighted to be able to gather in-person to celebrate Alberta's environmental achievements. To add to the excitement, this year's Emerald Awards were the first in Alberta Emerald Foundation history to be recorded live for those who weren't able to make to the in-person event.

The Awards opened with a teaching from indigenous elder Ira Provost, afterwich the mic was handed over to Emerald Award host Gordie Lucius, an Edmonton-based comedian, creator, and writer. The Awards also featured a performance by Walter MacDonald White Bear, Singer-songwriter, educator, and motivational speaker.

After the awards were handed out we gathered in the recption space of the performance hall for cocktail hour to celebrate and connect with one another. The cocktail hour featured Hors d'oeuvres and drink service by Devour Catering, who worked with the AEF to incorporate food and drinks from local business and Emerald Award shortlisters.

Over 200 people joined us at this year's Emerald Awards, many of which travelled from across the province to attend. After the awards the live-recording was shared on our YouTube channel and as of November 9, 2022 it has been viewed 4,000 times by viewers across the globe and has reached 69,300 people.

## Sharing Stories Content

This year, we were pleased to create the third seasons of our sharing stories content and release them through virtual launch events for each. These events served as an opportunity to gather as a community and to build excitement for our content.

#### Emerald Documentary Series

The third season of the Emerald Documentary Series features the 30th Annual Emerald Award recipients in their own documentary short created by Hoopla Media. The series was launched through a virtual event on zoom on January 13, 2020.

The premiere of the third season of the documentary series was attended by 119 people, all eager to learn more about Alberta's environmental good-news stories.

The videos are available on our website and YouTube channel, and as of November 9, 2022 have been viewed a total of 4,669 times to date and have reached over 19,000 people.

#### Emerald Speakers Series

In our version of TED Talks, the Emerald Speakers Series invites our Emerald recipients to share an inspiring presentation based on their award-winning work with a live audience.

To celebrate Earth month we premiered Season Three of the Emerald Speaker series on Zoom and offered a live Q&A session with the presenters. This event was attended by 20 viewers from across Alberta.

These pre-recorded speaker series videos are available on our website, Facebook, and YouTube channel and as of November 9, 2022 have been collectively viewed 565 times and reached 5,375 people.

#### What On EARTH Can We Do?

2021-2022 marked the launch of season three and the beginning of season four for our podcast, What On EARTH Can We Do? (WOECWD).

WOECWD features candid conversations with Alberta's environmental leaders to unpack various environmental topics and figure out how we can combat climate change as individuals.

As of November 9, 2022 we have released 21 episodes and received a total of 3,515 listens.

## Tell Your Story

2021-2022 marked the second year of our Tell Your Story (TYS) program, which shares our advice, experience, and connections to help strengthen our province's environmental voice. It features tutorials, webinars, partnerships, and community building.

This year we hosted three webinars:

- 1. Naheyawin: Practical, Sustainable, and Indigenous Solutions 30 attendees
- 2. "The Social Media Rage Machine": What To Do if Your Business Attracts Negative Attention Online 23 attendees
- 3. Creating Climate Language That Brings Us Together 30 attendees

Each webinar was recorded and posted on our YouTube channel to ensure that the knowledge gained by attendees could also be gained by the general public. As of November 9, 2022 these three webinars have been viewed 220 times and have reached 3,662 people.

we distributed a total of \$15,750 in grants to youth-led and youth-targeted environmental projects across the province.


Some examples of the projects we helped to fund include pollinator gardens, indoor grow towers for vegetables, and hands-on classroom education on renewable enrgy.






